## Texturized and Transferred Images on Herb Pots

#### Materials Used:

- 1. Aves Apoxie Fix It, bisque or terracotta color
- 2. Gloves
- 3. Assorted terracotta plant pots
- 4. Hard rubber stamps or mark makers
- 5. Freezer paper
- 6. Ink jet printer, black and white or color
- 7. Tongue blade to burnish
- 8. Clean cloth
- 9. Art brush
- 10. Acrylic paint, your choice of color
- 11. Water

### Technique

- 1. If you want to transfer an image onto your pot, prepare the image now, using freezer paper on your ink jet. Set print for high quality
- 2. Mix Aves Apoxie Fix It Part A and B, in equal parts, according to package directions. Make sure both color shades blend to one.
- 3. Once mixed, flatten the clay into a thin pizza shape, using your fingers, directly onto the pot. You decide how much to add, depending on your project.
- 4. Smooth the clay edges to the pot with fingers, as you work
- 5. Texturize the clay with stamps or found objects
- 6. Smooth a space to place an image transfer
- 7. Carefully place image, ink side or toner side down, onto the Fix It clay, and burnish all areas of image so that it is adhered well to the clay.
- 8. For the ink jet image, leave your entire piece to dry an additional 8 to 10 hours, or overnight.
- 9. Remove the freezer paper image from your pot, by pulling it off in one piece. The image should be waterproof and permanent. with a smooth finish.
- 10. Dilute a bit of acrylic paint with water and go over the texture to make it pop. Rub off excess with a dry cloth

### Tips

- Wear non latex gloves when mixing Apoxie Fix It, Part A and Part B. It is sticky when mixed
- Working time once mixed is 1 to 3 hours.
- Use a clean tool to remove clay from each of the Part A and Part B containers. Cross contaminating Part A with Part B will cause the clay to harden in the tub.

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
